As an M.D., I happen to be a big fan of the law, which will help millions of Americans (and their employers) get the health insurance they need. But, as with all laws, some provisions are starting to take shape. What does the law do? The overarching goal of the Affordable Care Act is to strengthen the safety net for low-income Americans and prevent them from ever falling below a certain poverty threshold. To qualify for federal funds, states must expand Medicaid and provide health insurance to their residents who do not have it. The health reform law also will gradually do away with job-based insurance plans by prohibiting insurance companies from denying coverage to people with pre-existing conditions, expanding mental health coverage and adding preventive services. Supporters of the law say it will eliminate insurance company abuses and increase the number of insured Americans. They also say the law is designed to rein in the skyrocketing cost of health care by, in part, requiring insurance companies to spend a certain percentage of premiums on care and prevention and for-profit insurance companies to cover customers regardless of their health. Most Americans will not see a change in how they pay for their health care, however. Employers still will be primarily responsible for covering their employees' health care. What's an employer's view? What the law doesn't do is change how employers provide health insurance or even how much employees pay for health care. Right now, employers pay for half or more of their employees' health insurance. Under the law, employers will be required to pick up the tab for a larger share. But, they may keep overall costs down by offering health plans with low premiums and few benefits. A growing number of employers are already doing just that. The employer contribution rate will rise incrementally from 25% this year to 35% in 2018 and then to a maximum of 40% in 2019. The law will allow employers to get a tax credit for each employee that remains on their plan for at least six c6a93da74d

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
